Dear Researchers,

The Research Services Office and Library, with the support of the DVCR, is embarking on a four week pilot project to implement ORCID® (Open Researcher and Contributor ID) with the School of Psychology. Following assessment and review, full University wide implementation is scheduled to occur in October-November 2015.

What is ORCID?

ORCID is an international, interdisciplinary, open, and not-for-profit registry of unique researcher identifiers. It is a hub that connects researchers and research [outputs](#) through the embedding of ORCID identifiers in key workflows, such as research profile maintenance, manuscript submissions, grant applications, and patent applications.

Why ORCID?

ORCID, unlike other author identifiers, is non-proprietary and has leveraged this advantage with integration across the scholarly research cycle, particularly with publishers, grant funders, and even other proprietary author identifiers (Scopus Author ID and Researcher ID).

Elsevier, Thomson Reuters, Nature and other major publishers have begun integrating ORCID iDs into the manuscript submission process, and embedding ORCID identifiers across their scientific and scholarly research ecosystem.

Grant funding bodies including the Australian Research Council and the National Health and Medical Research Council are in the process of building integration with ORCID.

What are the benefits of ORCID?

1. **Unique identifier:** An ORCID iD is unique and will belong to the individual researcher throughout their scholarly career, even if you leave Flinders University.
2. **Ensure credit for work:** The persistent identifier distinguishes the scholar from other researchers and ensures consistent, reliable attribution of their works.
3. **Save time:** ORCID integration in publisher workflows and in grant submission processes reduces redundant entry of biographical and bibliographical data in multiple systems.

ORCID Pilot Project at Flinders University

The implementation project will pilot ORCID with the School of Psychology.

The pilot project commencement and completion is scheduled to occur during August-September 2015 (four week duration).

The implementation will encourage researchers to create a new ORCID iD or connect their existing ORCID iD through the University's research reporting system RePortal.

The pilot project seeks "read only" access to the ORCID profile paving the way for two-way data exchange in the future.

The pilot project will target School of Psychology researchers but will not preclude others from connecting or creating an ORCID iD via RePortal.

A snapshot of the data captured by this project will inform the implementation strategy of University-wide roll out of ORCID at Flinders University and provide evidence to support KPI/target recommendations.

The Research Service Office and Library are launching a pilot program to implement ORCID® (Open Researcher and Creator ID) within the School of Psychology.

ORCID is an independent non-profit effort to provide an open registry of unique researcher identifiers and open services to link research activities and organizations to these identifiers. An ORCID iD is a 16 digit persistent unique identifier that follows an individual throughout their career and connects researchers and research through the embedding of ORCID identifiers in key workflows, such as research profile maintenance, manuscript submissions, grant applications, and patent applications.

Why? The ability to quickly and confidently identify you and your work is critical to your reputation and career. Funders, publishers, scholarly societies and associations, fellow researchers and potential collaborators can use your ORCID profile to accurately identify you and your work.

What are the benefits of ORCID?

1. **Uniquely yours:** Your ORCID iD is unique and will belong to you throughout your scholarly career, even if you leave Flinders University.
2. **Get credit for your work:** The persistent identifier distinguishes you from other researchers and ensures consistent, reliable attribution of your work.

- Update your profile via ORCID.org, for details on how to import your citations into your ORCID record please see [Update Your Profile](#) in our [ORCID Help Guide](#).
- Granting Flinders access to your ORCID profile will allow the University to push data from the RMIS in to your ORCID profile.
- Publications added to your ORCID profile from other sources such as Scopus or Web of Science can be extracted and added to RMIS automatically.
